How much time does your congregation spend talking about money? Some would immediately shout out that their church spends far too much time talking about money.

How often does your pastor preach about money? One Sunday? Two Sundays? Is it just an annual "Sermon on the Amount?"

When you stop and think about how much of our lives revolve around money and how dependent we are on money and how important money is to us, we probably should be spending many more Sundays engaged with preaching, teaching and discussing money.

My 15-year-old daughter is always highly aware of what she needs to return to high school and maintain her status as a *fashionista*. Usually, I dread the final bill following a back-to-school shopping excursion.

This year is different. My daughter attended the *Creation Festival* in Mt. Union, PA, in June. *Creation* is one of the largest Christian gatherings on the east coast, a five-day event bringing together nationally renowned Christian recording artists and speakers. At *Creation*, my daughter decided to sponsor a child through Compassion International for \$40.00 per month. She called me before signing up, and I explained that she would need to do household chores and cut back on spending to come up with the monthly contribution. This would be her mission, not her mother's or mine. She agreed. My daughter wanted to give sacrificially to help a little girl in need. She made a decision to follow Jesus, and do without some of the back-to-school fashion "necessities."

Jesus calls each of us to let go of the prevailing messages of our culture and become generous disciples. I am proud of my daughter as she begins to take seriously what it means to follow Jesus.

During this time of back-to-school specials, there will many opportunities to consider how we could use our old gear or do without to help others in need, living as generous disciples and faithfully following Jesus.
