# from your Bible

Acts 16:11–15, 40; 1 Corinthians 1:26–30, NIV—From Troas we put out to sea and sailed straight for Samo-

thrace, and the next day we went on to Neapolis. <sup>12</sup> From there we traveled to Philippi, a Roman colony and the leading city of that district of Macedonia. And we stayed there several days. <sup>13</sup> On the Sabbath we went outside the

city gate to the river, where we expected to find a place of prayer. We sat down and began to speak to the women who had gathered there. <sup>14</sup> One of those listening was a woman from the city of Thyatira named Lydia, a dealer in purple cloth. She was a worshiper of God. The Lord opened her heart to respond to Paul's message. <sup>15</sup> When she and the members of her household were baptized, she invited us to her home. "If you consider me a believer in the Lord," she said, "come and stay at my house." And she persuaded us. <sup>40</sup> After Paul and Silas came out of the prison, they went to Lydia's house, where they met with the brothers and sisters and encour-

aged them. Then they left. **1 Corinthians 1:26** Brothers and sisters, think of what you were when you were called. Not many of you were wise by human standards; not many were influential; not many were of noble birth. <sup>27</sup> But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong. <sup>28</sup> God chose the lowly things of this world and the despised things—and the things that are not—to nullify the things that are, <sup>29</sup> so that no one may boast before him. <sup>30</sup> It is because of him that you are in Christ Jesus, who has become for us wisdom from God—that is, our righteousness, holiness and redemption.

## Scripture discussion

In today's Scripture passage, you learned about Lydia. She is considered a model of service and hospitality. Paul enjoyed the hospitality of Lydia's household, as well as the benefits of a relationship with such a prominent and well-respected woman.

As a dealer of purple cloth, Lydia was connected to the elite and wealthy in the area. Rich and royal people in the Roman world could afford purple cloth. It signified status. Lydia owned a business and a home, which was unusual for a woman at this time. She was a woman of faith. She opened her home to others and shared her hospitality with them.
